We greet all, in the British Isles and abroad, with happiest and heartiest Naurooz greetings, realising that in all parts of the world Baha'i brethren will be thinking of each other, chanting the Glad Tidings of Abha, and praising God. With this Spring Festival commences the 87th year of the New Era, and, thanks be to God, the sweet call of Abha—the call of Unity and World Fellowship—rises above the discordant voices of the troubled world more insistently than ever.

We celebrate far more than an Annual Springtime, for we celebrate the Spiritual Springtime of a new world; a time of liberation from the long winter of a worn out Age; and the situation is worthy

of recapitulation.

Mankind is born of God's Loving Thought, the mighty power of which is known as the Holy Spirit. Manchester.

The meetings on the first Saturday in the month on the "Baha'i Teachings for the Individual and the Community" have been well attended. The earlier ones were devoted to the exposition of the Teachings as they applied to the Individual. Bradford.

London.

Since the last News Letter was sent out, the thoughts of the London friends have been occupied with the Round Table Conference, and prayers were offered constantly at Walmar House for the guidance of its deliberations. One distinguished member who visited the Baha'i Room and bought many books, spoke of the Movement as being in his opinion the only hope for India's future.

On Saturday, February 14th, an informal meeting was held at which Lady Blomfield gave an account of some of her experiences

on her last visit to Akka.

We append a brief account of this talk which we feel will interest those who had not the opportunity to hear her.

A MORNING IN AKKA.

I accompanied the Greatest Holy Leaf, the Holy Mother and her daughter to the fortified Castle of Akka.

Here are the long flight of uneven stone steps, leading to the little barred window, from which waved the hand of Baha'u'llah, to the piteous joy of pilgrims from far off Persia.

But the most vivid impression was made by the old prison in the centre of the town.

A long low building down several steps, no air, no light, save through the door—slime covered walls, across one end is a stone seat, where the jailor sat holding a scourge, lead weighted.

The prisoners were herded together, tortured by heavy chains which cut into their flesh, whilst writhing on the muddy floor—sometimes a maddened creature would shriek—then the jailor, trampling over the bodies of men who lay in his path, would brutally flog him until he died.

Eventually the poor mutilated body was unchained, dragged

to the door, and thrown into the prison yard.

Into this evil dungeon Baha'u'llah and Abdu'l Baha were one day cast: I could not describe the expression on the faces of those beloved ladies, as they stood, for the first time, in this place of horror.

Agha Mirza Hossein, who was imprisoned at the same time, was with us, he was, therefore, able to describe what happened.

Not called upon to endure exile, prison, fortress, or vile dungeon, upon us is showered, freely, the fruit of their calamity. Shall we not let it now be seen what our endeavours will bring forth?

NOTE. The old prison is no longer used. The Governor conducts the fortress prison on the most humane lines. Instead of chains there is training; for flogging—there is mental care and good food. Surely the influence of Abdu'l Baha is changing the desert of Misery into a garden of Content.

"And they shall be given the valley of Achor (Akka) for the

door of hope.'

On February 26th, a 19-day Feast was held at Walmar House. About twenty-five friends were present, Mr. Romer acting as chairman. After prayer and reading, the friends were invited to consult freely on the affairs of the Cause in London. It was agreed that the room at Walmar House fulfilled most of the needs of the work and that especially in view of the earnest desire of Shoghi Effendithat it should be maintained, the believers should make every effort to overcome financial difficulties with unshaken faith that they will be supported and guided by the Master's Presence and Will.

This letter will appear just as the time is coming for the election of members of the Spiritual Assemblies for the forthcoming year. These elections are conducted on a method diametrically opposed

to those of the material world.

The electors are begged to approach their duty as voters in a spirit of prayer and reliance on the Guidance of the Holy Spirit. Abdu'l Baha gave his direct commands again and again. "No political methods are to enter Baha'i Elections.—They must be elections through the guidance of the Spirit." And again, "When politics enter into Baha'i elections the spirit is killed and inharmony arises." If we desire to carry out the Master's wish we shall guard even in thought against premature decisions and avoid discussions and solicitations among others as to who should be elected and who should fill future offices.

A meeting is held on Sunday afternoons at 4 o'clock by Mrs. George, at her house, 15, Fernshaw Road, King's Road, Chelsea. After a short address questions and discussion are welcomed.
