ANNUAL CONVENTION.

The Convention was held on April 28th, at the Bahai Centre, London. Mr. Alfred Sugar was elected chairman and Mr. Coles and Miss Goldman appointed to act as tellers. Reports were read and after helpful discussions approved. The Treasurer's report indicated that publicity and teaching expenditures in the past year had been chiefly sustained by receipts from the sale of literature. This situation does certainly demand the urgent attention of the friends. National funds need their immediate support.

Mr. Alfred Sugar submitted a proposal for the formation of a National Teaching Committee. This motion was warmly accepted for recommendation to the National Assembly.

NATIONAL SPIRITUAL ASSEMBLY.

At the first meeting of the Assembly the following were appointed for executive work:—Miss Challis (chairman), Mr. Spendlove (vice-chairman), Mrs. Slade (secretary and treasurer), Miss Baxter (assistant-secretary), Mrs. George and Mr. Balyuzi (editors of the News Letter).

NATIONAL TEACHING COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed by the National Spiritual Assembly is composed of the following members :--Mr. H. M. Balyuzi (representing the N.S.A.), Sister Challis (representing the Bournemouth Spiritual Assembly), Mrs. Isabel Slade (representing the London 3.A.), Mr. F. St. G. Spendlove (temporary chairman and secretary), Mr. Alfred Sugar (representing the Manchester S.A.).

The Committee has been formed to act as consultants to the N.S.A. in matters of national teaching, to arrange the visits of Baha'i teachers to various centres, draw up study outlines, recommend books and meetings suitable for teaching, and keep in touch with isolated believers and interested people. Friends are urged to inform the committee of any projected visits to England of overseas Baha'i teachers or speakers. Consultation on teaching problems is invited. The secretary's address is Yarne, Hatchford, Nr. Cobham, Surrey.

COMMITTEES.

The following Committees have been appointed by the Spiritual Assembly, to function for the current year : Finance Committee (chairman, Mr. Alizade), Hospitality Committee, Meetings Committee (chairman, Mrs. Basil Hall), Publicity Committee, Room Committee (chairman, Mrs. Tovey), Teaching Committee (chairman, Mrs. George).

WOMEN'S SERVICE COMMITTEE.

As announced in the last issue of the News Letter, this Committee was formed to carry out charitable and humanitarian projects. Mrs. Tovey is a new member of this Committee, and the officers remain unchanged.

On the evening of May 13th, the Committee held a "Concert and Dance Recital," in aid of its funds. Thanks to the efforts of Miss Molly Brown, who had arranged the programme and secured the assistance and kind help of able and excellent performers, the entertainment was very successful. Nearly a hundred were present.

FEASTS AND ANNIVERSARIES.

The first day of the Rizvan (April 21st) was celebrated at the Centre. Though it was Easter Sunday, attendance was beyond expectation. On the twelfth day (May 2nd), Lady Blomfield held a heautiful feast at ber home. Lady Blomfield told her guests of the noble and inspiring life of the Master, which left everyone deeply impressed. The Declaration of the Bab (May 23rd) was celebrated at the Centre. Miss Florence Pinchon gave a vivid description of that memorable night in 1844, when the Light first broke upon a darkened world.

The anniversary of the ascension of Baha'u'llah (May 28th), was solemnly observed at the Centre.

EXHIBITION.

An Exhibition of Baha'i books, pictures and objects of interest, was opened at the Centre on April 29th, and continued for a fortnight. Lady Blomfield kindly lent the exhibition some of her invaluable books, pictures and garments associated with the memory of Abdul-Baha. Many people visited the exhibition.

MEETINGS.

Sunday evening meetings have been continued with success. Lack of space prevents mentioning speakers and subjects. Visiting speakers have been Mr. Judd of the League of Nations Union Education Committee, and Mr. Goddard of the New Commonwealth. Miss Goldman gave a very instructive talk in April, during her stay in London.

A special Jubilee Thanksgiving Meeting was held on Sunday, May 5th. Lady Blomfield, who was the speaker, dwelt upon Baha'u'llah's Tablet to Queen Victoria, and the qualities of citizenship enjoined by Him. Praise was rendered for the "Just Monarch" of this realm.

The Wednesday Evening Study Class is regularly held, and the discussions have proved to be valuable. This class is under the supervision of the Teaching Committee.

VISITORS.

Miss Julia Goldman stayed in London for a while in April and May. Mrs. Matteson and Dr. and Mrs. Fozdar, who were with us for nearly six months, left for their homelands in April. We wish them all good luck and success in their efforts, and are thankful for the valuable help they gave us during their sojourn in this metropolis.

London.

TWO GREAT LOSSES.

Mr. Harry H. Romer and Miss Elsie Lea passed into Eternal Life on April 13th and June 10th respectively. We have sustained great losses in the departure of these faithful souls. They served the Cause of Baha'u'llah with courage and self-effacement. Theirs is the abiding satisfaction that on this earth they were given the opportunity and the vision to uphold firmly the sacred principles of world unity and world Brotherhood.

Mrs. Isabel Slade, the Secretary of the National Assembly writes of Mr. Romer—" With the exception of a few months in Berlin he and his wife have been in London for nearly nine years, and the Cause has benefitted by their valuable services. His loveable nature, his simple faith and his clear vision gave him a unique place in our midst. He was always reluctant to take a prominent place or to speak in public, but whenever he could be prevailed upon, his words carried the great weight of sincerity. His outstanding characteristic was his utter straightforwardness. He never compromised with Truth as he saw it, and his singlemindedness made his vision clear."

"The friends gathered in the chapel at the Hampstead Cemetery for a Baha'i service on April 17th. While his earthly form was being laid to rest, passages from the Hidden Words were recited."

"His passing has deprived us also of the services of Mrs. Romer whose health forbids her to take up active work for the present. The hearts of the friends go out in love for the grief that she bears at the severing of the earthly ties, though the true and beautiful spiritual union that was theirs will be strengthened in service to Baha'u'llah."

Miss Florence Pinchon, writing of Miss Lea, says :---" The conrage and fortitude our dear Sister showed during the many months of her painful illness, bore witness to her quiet resignation to the will of God, and her simple faith in His all-knowing wisdom. For well she knew that, ' My calamity is my providence. In appearance it is fire and vengeance ; yet, in reality it is Light and Mercy.'"

"Elsie Lea passed on Whit-Monday, and was laid to rest on the following Friday in the Old Highgate Cemetery. Nine representatives of the Baha'i Cause attended the funeral ceremonies, and a Memorial Service was held at the Centre, Grosvenor Place, on Sunday, June 23rd.

"It was in London that Elsie Lea had the great privilege of meeting Abdul-Baha, during his visit to England in 1911. The spiritual results of that wonderful contact remained with her through all the ensuing years, ultimately leading to a steadfast devotion to the Cause, and to the development of a character distinguished by its generous and unselfish deeds."
