

# HELIANTHUS **Mitts**

*Marigolds* are a very popular flower in the midwestern United States, as are sunflowers (the Kansas state flower). The Helianthus Mitts pattern pairs handspun marigold-dyed fiber with a stranded colorwork design featuring a sunflower. In addition, the project uses handspun fiber dyed with black walnut (the Missouri state nut), another local dyestuff found in the Midwest that is easy to use as a natural alternative to chemical dyes.

I divided the fiber into two batches and dyed it with marigolds and walnuts before spinning (see "Easy Methods of Dyeing Fiber Naturally with Ubiquitous Midwestern Plants" in *Spin Off* Summer 2018). I predrafted, then spun with a short forward draw with scotch tension. From the singles, which measured 36 wpi, I spun 449 yards of marigold and 421 yards of walnut yarn.

#### **MATERIALS**

**Fiber** 3½ oz Knit Picks Bare Stroll Roving, 75% superwash Merino/25% nylon.

**Yarn** MC (dyed with walnuts): 3-ply; 125 yd; 1,684 ypp; 14 wpi; sportweight.

CC (dyed with marigolds): Navajo-ply; 85 yd; 1,732 ypp; 14 wpi; sportweight.

**Needles** U.S. size 2 (2.75 mm). Adjust needle size if necessary to obtain the correct gauge.

**Notions** Marker (m); stitch holder; tapestry needle. **Gauge** 36 sts and 49 rnds = 4" in charted patt. **Finished Size** 634" circumference and 634" tall.

#### Note

 These mitts are worked in the round from the cuff up with a thumb gusset.

#### **MITTS**

With CC and using the old Norwegian method, loosely CO 57 sts. Place marker (pm) and join in the rnd.

**Next rnd** \*K2 with CC, k1 with MC; rep from \* to end.

**Next rnd** \*K2 with CC, p1 with MC; rep from \* to end.

Rep last rnd 19 more times.

**Next rnd** With MC, [k1f&b, k18] 3 times—60 sts.

If desired, pm to separate thumb gusset sts from rest of mitt to help with inc placement.

# Left mitt only

Work Rows 1-39 of Left Mitt chart—82 sts.

**Next rnd** Place first 25 sts on holder for thumb, with MC and using the backward-loop method, CO 3 sts, knit to end—60 sts rem.

# Right mitt only

Work Rows 1-39 of Right Mitt chart—82 sts.

**Next rnd** With MC, knit to last 25 sts, place next 25 sts on holder for thumb, using the backward-loop method, CO 3 sts—60 sts rem.

#### **Both mitts**

With MC, knit 1 rnd.


**Next rnd** \*K2 with CC, p1 with MC; rep from \* to end. Rep last rnd 7 more times. With CC, BO all sts pwise.

## **Stranded Colorwork Tips**

- Catching the unused color float on the wrong side of the fabric every 5 stitches will help keep a tidier interior that won't catch on fingers and jewelry as much. Stagger the catches to minimize peeking through of the unused color.
- Working a stranded colorwork project inside out with the stitches spread out a bit on the right needle can help to keep proper tension, as stranded colorwork isn't as stretchy as single color stockinette stitch.




#### Left Mitt



60 sts to 82 sts

#### Right Mitt



•	purl with MC
×	knit with CC
MR	M1R with M0

M1L with MC

### **Thumb**

Place 25 thumb sts onto needles.

**Next rnd** With MC, pick up and knit 4 sts along crook of thumb, [k6, k2tog] 2 times, k7, [k2tog] 3 times—24 sts rem.

Pm and join in the rnd.

**Next rnd** \*K2 with CC, p1 with MC; rep from \* to end.

Rep last rnd 3 more times. With CC, knit 1 rnd. With CC, BO all sts pwise.

# **FINISHING**

Weave in ends. Block to measurements.
