## LIGHT UP THE NIGHT

WHY DO WE HANG CHRISTMAS LIGHTS?

The first string of twinkling lights illuminating your neighbor's house is always a telltale sign of the upcoming seasonal festivities. Christmas lights are a holiday staple, but have you ever wondered where this beloved tradition started?

The tradition of hanging lights on the tree originally started with candles. Because this posed an immense fire hazard, Edward Hibberd Johnson, a close friend of Thomas Edison and vice president of the Edison Electric Light Company, vowed to find a better way to decorate Christmas trees with light. In December 1882, three years after Edison's invention of the lightbulb in November 1879, Johnson handwired 80 red, white, and blue lightbulbs together and wound them around a Christmas tree in his parlor window. A passing reporter saw the spectacle and declared in the Detroit Post and Tribune, "One can hardly imagine anything prettier."

Johnson continued this tradition, increasing the number of lights each year and eventually putting them up outside. But because electricity was still a new concept, many years passed before the fad took off for regular Americans. In 1923, President Calvin Coolidge began the tradition of lighting the National Christmas Tree, which spurred the idea of selling stringed lights commercially. By the 1930s,



families everywhere were buying boxes of bulbs by the dozen. Today, an estimated 150 million Christmas lights are sold in America each year, decorating 80 million homes and consuming 6% of the nation's electricity every December.

Whether you'll be putting up your own lights or appreciating the most impressive light displays in your neighborhood or town, let the glow fill you with joy this season. Just don't leave them up until February!

## BÉSAME COSMETICS' REPRODUCTION MAKEUP PROMISES ALL THREE

Audrey Hepburn. Marilyn Monroe. Grace Kelly. Their names alone conjure up images of classic feminine beauty and a longing for days gone by. Hollywood is still filled with beautiful faces today, but for many women, modern pageantry just can't compare to the glamour and romance of the past, when bold lipsticks and short skirts were still daring. One of those women is Gabriela Hernandez, the founder of California makeup company Bésame Cosmetics. Her brand strives to capture the past by painstakingly reproducing lipstick, blush, and mascara from the 1900s, down to perfectly matched colors and detailed packaging.

Every product in the Bésame cosmetics line has a story and date attached. Hernandez delves into vintage makeup for inspiration, and when she finds the perfect shade of lipstick or blush — like 1941's Victory Red or 1931's Carmine (a "neutral orange-red") — she and her team recreate it using cruelty-free ingredients that are safe for sensitive skin. The presentation is as faithful as the colors: Bésame's mascara is sold in historically accurate cake form (just add water and apply with a tiny brush), the lipsticks come encased in "a red and gold lipstick bullet inspired by the tubes of the 1940s" and are cut in a classic shape, and the powder foundation is sold in vintage-looking plastic compacts.



In addition to its historic lines, Bésame also partners with Disney to bring the looks from its classic cartoons to makeup tables nationwide. Those collaborative collections include products based on Mickey Mouse, "Peter Pan," and, most recently, "Sleeping Beauty." The latter was crafted to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the 1959 film and includes an eyeshadow palette designed to look like the film's jewel-encrusted storybook, a "royal vanity mirror" plated in rose gold, shades of lipstick matched to Aurora and Maleficent's lip colors (which Disney provided), and even a "Make It Blue Make It Pink" color-changing lipstick that harkens back to the film's fairies!
