EXTENSION OF TAXIWAY BRAVO

LENGTHENING TAXIWAY BRAVO WILL SAVE PASSENGERS TIME AND IMPROVE AIRCRAFT SAFETY

Canberra Airport is extending Taxiway Bravo to provide more efficient and safer aircraft movements, reduce the amount of time planes take to taxi at Canberra Airport and replace the current, historic taxiway that was built at the same time as the original hangars, in the 1940s.

Taxiway B currently runs two-thirds of the length of the main runway. Today, after landing, planes must leave the runway and taxi on historic Taxiway A, on the far side of the airfield.

The planes are then required to cross the main runway to reach the terminal. This often requires waiting for other planes to land before they can cross.

When construction is complete, Taxiway B will run the entire length of the main runway at Canberra Airport, closer to the terminal, eliminating the need for planes to wait and cross the runway to get to the terminal via Taxiway A, which has been refurbished and resurfaced many times since it was built in the 1940s, soon after World War II.

"Canberra Airport is recognised by the ACT and NSW Governments as a global gateway to our international city and the region," says Mr Thomson. "This taxiway extension will allow planes to vacate our runway more safely and quickly, getting visitors to our nation's capital and all that the region has to offer."

Construction is expected to take between 12 and 18 months.

AIRPORT TEAM VISITS CHINA

The Canberra Airport team has travelled to China with ACT Chief Minister Andrew Barr and a representative of the ACT government's tourism bureau, VisitCanberra, to speak to airlines about direct flights.

The group included the airport's new Head of Aviation,

Michael Thomson and Head of Marketing and Communications, Melissa Evans.

Along with the ACT government team, they met with China Southern Airlines, Air China and Beijing Capital Airlines representatives. The group travelled to Guangzhou and Beijing to meet with Chinese officials, politicians and business leaders. They also toured the Guangzhou Baiyun International Airport, China's third busiest airport and the soon to be completed Daxing, which will become Beijing's second international airport. The delegation met with the Australian Ambassador to China, at his residence.

Trips to China have become much more regular in the last few years as efforts to bring a Chinese carrier to Canberra continue.

CRITICAL FUNDING TO HELP END RHD

\$35 MILLION FOR STREP A VACCINE AND PROMISE OF \$33 MILLION IN COMMUNITY-LED SOLUTIONS AIMS TO SAVE CHILDREN

In February, the Hon. Ken Wyatt AM MP announced the Morrison Government is investing \$35 million over 3 years to accelerate the development of a Strep A vaccine, a strategic, long-term commitment to stop the bacteria that causes RHD and many other health issues. Strep A is considered one of the most deadly pathogens on Earth.

In April, Opposition Leader Bill Shorten committed to \$33 million in funding for immediate, community-led action on RHD in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. It was a positive outcome after efforts by the Snow Foundation and many other groups to help Indigenous Australian communities lead their own RHD prevention and diagnostic efforts and secure more government funding to help other communities do the same.

Georgina Byron, CEO of The Snow Foundation, said the commitment of funding for long-term and short-term solutions marked a significant step in the quest to end RHD. "We are united with END RHD in aiming to ensure that no child born in Australia from this day forward should die of RHD or its complications and we welcome this funding as a solid start to ending RHD," Ms Byron said.
