Online Bibliography

Over the past few months, Lisa Paduch has been deeply engaged in creating an online bibliography on the topic of the Holocaust and photography. This initiative, launched by the EHRI Expert Group on Holocaust Photography, has resulted in a Zotero database containing over 1,100 titles — providing a valuable starting point for further research.

In early March 1943, two major deportation operations took place almost simultaneously across the Reich: the so-called *Fabrikaktion* and the deportation of Sinti:zze and Romni:ja to the Auschwitz extermination camp under the *Auschwitz Decree*.

During the *Fabrikaktion*, Jews who had been temporarily spared deportation due to their forced labor in key armaments factories were registered and deported. No photographs of this operation have survived. However, photo series from **Remscheid** and **Neustrelitz** document the deportation of Sinti:zze and Romni:ja.

The photos from Neustrelitz were presumably taken in secret by Chaplain Heinrich Kottmann. The photographer of the Remscheid images remains unknown, but the perspective suggests they were taken in close proximity to the perpetrators.
