

Welcome message

2023 was a busy year as we embedded the net zero framework to help members reduce emissions.

In this report we highlight some of the amazing collective work of our CitySwitch members. This year we achieved an average emissions intensity of 30 kg Co2 per sqm. It was great to see 47% of reported electricity from renewable sources. Also, 35 members are Climate Active carbon neutral certified and 51 either committed to the Science Based Targets initiative or have Paris aligned targets.

Another important part of our work is the educational program to build capacity within our businesses and embed climate action in their operations. These past 12 months we presented material on setting teams up for success, reducing office waste and committing to emissions reduction in supply chains. It was great to have two thirds of you attend our various online events and take advantage of our practical, how-to resources and case studies available on our new website. We also saw an increase in the value of the program to your net zero ambitions.

We hope you share these results with your executive teams and are inspired to learn from other members to accelerate your organisational priorities toward net zero. It would also be great to hear from you about how your business compares to the average 70 kWh of electricity use per sqm that emerged from our shared reporting.

Waverley Council, Ballarat City Council and Yarra City Council joined us this year. CitySwitch enables all levels of government to work together, and support businesses move towards net zero. We love working with you in this important decade of climate action.

Looking forward, we are excited to be partnering with the Commonwealth Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) to help reduce emissions in the office sector in the coming years. CitySwitch members will be well equipped in the event the Commercial Building Disclosure program expands to office tenancies and the Commonwealth introduces mandatory climate-related financial reporting. Both of these policy directions we look forward to seeing this year or in the not-too-distant future.

Program reach

CitySwitch is for all office-based businesses. Our members come from many sectors – finance, legal, engineering, advertising, health and more. They come from the private and public sectors and include not-for-profits. 80% of our members have one office and the remaining have multiple offices across the country.

In 2023, we reviewed our membership base. We wanted to find out which companies are committed to the program and reducing emissions. We have 213 business members managing 744 office tenancies across Australia. This will be our new baseline membership from which we will expand the reach and impact of our program.



Member impact

We help office-based business reduce emissions by mapping a pathway to net zero.

^{*}Members report on a 12-month period within the past 20 months to allow for calendar or financial year reporting.

^{**47%} of members reporting in the 2022 report provided their data again in 2023.

^{***}The calculation for carbon emissions this year includes stationary emissions covering emissions from electricity, gas, diesel and LPG used for stationary energy. It does not include emissions from fleet fuel use. There was a 58% reduction in carbon emissions since 2022, noting that members who report fluctuates from year to year.

^{****}The decrease in the carbon emissions intensity is due to the increase of renewables. 58% of tenancies purchased renewables.

^{*****}The increase in the percentage of resource recovery initiatives is likely due to additional options added to the response list.


